Fiat!

"Have courage. It is I. Do not be afraid."

The role of saints and mystics in the age of the Church is to help the faithful to a greater understanding of the truths of revelation. The great doctors of the mystical life (St John of the Cross, St. Teresa of Avila etc) help us to understand the journey of the soul. Especially, they show us that the soul which wishes to attain the heights of perfection must be prepared to be purified from the roots of its human selfishness.

Such is the journey of Saint Peter in today's gospel. He along with the other disciples has to endure a night of fear and trial wherein their human weakness is exposed. When they have exhausted all their apparent human strengths they have to cry out in fear when the physical and spiritual dangers have become one. St Peter then starts his journey to the Lord; it starts in confidence and desire but when he once again looks to himself he fails; but just as he is about to be swallowed up by the depths he cries out, "Lord save me!"

Principle 1: "To be able to abandon ourselves to God, we must first have felt abandoned by him."

Principle 2: "We often seek solutions outside of the problems whereas in reality they come from within them."

Principe 3: "To conquer fear, our desire to be with the Master must be greater."

Principle 4: We shall never reach the Lord's hands excepting by falling into them.

Principle 5:St. Peter's weakness as pointed out by the Lord was that he was in two minds; his heart was divided between the Master and the world.

Principle 6: A soul who conquers these trials always will bring Jesus to others.

Principle 7: The end of the journey is to fall and worship the Lord.

It seems to me that the current situation is teaching all of us, whether religious or not that in the end we cannot depend upon ourselves, only God can provide the solution to the soul's and humanities problems. So let us not fear the darkness or the waves that may appear to engulf us. Jesus revealed, "My daughter, thinking about yourself blinds your mind... it forms a net around you composed of weaknesses, oppression, melancholies, and fears.....on the other hand not thinking about yourselves but thinking only of Me in everything, is light for the mind which forms a divine enchantment. This net is made of light, fortitude, joy and trust."(Luisa Piccarreta 16.8.1912) God bless, Fr. Dominic
