Fiat!

Dear Faithful,

This Sunday Jesus tells us the great parable of the Wedding Feast. There is so much that one can draw from this parable. However, I would like to concentrate on one simple question that this parable raises in my mind. Why did the guests refuse the invitation? What made the guests prefer their own interests to the point that they would slaughter the servants of the King? Why would they prefer their own unhappiness and misery rather than the unalloyed joy of the wedding feast? This can also be put as follows: why do we prefer our sin and attachments which we know cause us misery rather than the happiness of following the Lord? The answers to this also explains the whole of God's salvation history and why he had to die on a cross. For us it may not be an outright rejection but as was said last week simply keeping areas of our life apart from Him.

Firstly, we do not like relinquishing control. To surrender our will to someone else (even though that be our creator) seems the ultimate indignity as Satan said "Non serviam - I shall not serve." When Satan said this, he meant it even though he knew exactly what would be the consequences. Moreover, if you asked him now, he would still refuse. So we keep our will and it is our human will that leads to all evils, maladies, anxieties, worries, unhappiness. So to stop us facing this very obvious choice and invitation, we invent and busy ourselves with all sorts of things to avoid having to face this obvious question: Will you give up everything and come follow me? Episode 7 of the Chosen gives two different and powerful responses to his. It is a masterpiece of Christian drama.

Second, what distracts us from God's call and our ability to freely chose Him are our "idols." What is an idol? Anything that takes the place of God or distracts us from obeying and following him. I suggest a very good exercise: firstly, make a list of our idols—I suggest keeping it to the two or three most important. Secondly, consider the steps we need to take to remove these from our lives. After all no one can enter to heaven that has any idols remaining. These idols might not be things; they may be ideas, they may be simple things, they could even be strengths.

In our lives some of us may find that we have idols/attachments that we seem powerless to get rid of. We pray, we try, we use the sacraments; but they have some sort of grip or vice upon us. We are enslaved or bound to them. A growing ministry in our diocese is that of "Unbound Ministry." It is ministering to someone to free them from their slavery. It is something we need to develop in our parish. Also, if it is something you feel that could help you just let me know.

Thirdly, on one level what can help is developing a taste for true beauty and simplicity. Good books, good films, good music can help us develop a taste for the spiritual things especially, music. But above all we need to pray for a taste and appreciation for the spiritual goods. In Chp 3 of Colossians St. Paul not only urges us to seek the things above but to develop a taste for them. (3:1-2) Let us ask Mary for the grace to give our errant will to her in return for her giving us her peace. God bless, Fr. Dominic

AIDS IN OUR SPIRITUAL BATTLE (2) (Previously Indulgences+Holy Water)

Rosary: This is our main weapon in our spiritual battle outside of the sacraments. Our Lady has asked us to pray it daily. She has assured us that it will defeat evil. May and October are special months but we should pray 5 decades daily and if possible more. Padre Piowhen not engaged almost continuously prayed the rosary. The rosary is contemplating the face of Jesus with Mary. It is to enter into the mysteries that we are contemplating. If at any time during the rosary God calls us to pause and contemplate we should do so. The goal of the rosary is for us to enter into the mysteries of the life of Christ. Sometimes we find ourselves concentrating on the words, sometimes on the mysteries and sometimes just gazing.

The promises attached to a true devotion to the rosary are enormous; e.g.

- 1. It is a powerful protection against hell; it will destroy vice and conquer sin.
- 2. It will withdraw the heart from the love of worldly things
- 3. The souls that is devoted to Mary by the saying of the rosary shall not perish.
- 4. A soul devoted to the rosary shall not die without the sacraments.
- 5. Devotion to the rosary is a great sign of predestination.

Very simple: Pray the rosary with devotion, regularly and the souls shall not be lost.
